The Caring Place Is Growing

Expansion from 5 to 8 Families Brings Need for More Volunteers

The Caring Place Transitional Housing Program has had some transitions of its own over the past few months. We are now serving eight families at a time in Cary, and they are living in entirely new rental units.

With help from landlords around town and volunteers, The Caring Place has expanded to eight units to fulfill the increased need for housing for homeless working families with children.

Even after the expansion, there is still a waiting list, Executive Director Susan Marcinko said. Because The Caring Place serves families, it is uniquely situated to help with the fastest growing segment of the homeless population, mothers with children. The 2008 point in time count children accounted for 15 percent of the homeless population.

More volunteers are needed in every area to serve the in-

creased numbers, especially direct support volunteers to commit to a four-month session with an individual family.

Volunteers share a community meal with the families on Thursday nights and then break into private sessions to give counseling and support. Training for this role is offered on the third Saturday morning of each month.

With the Thursday night sessions expanded to upwards of 65 people, more meal providers are also needed. Most meal providers are now splitting up and providing half a meal, which stretches our resources out even further.

Finally, financial support is always needed to keep up eight rental units around town, as well as other administrative costs of the program.

Inexpensive rental units are difficult to come by in Cary, and this Fall, families had to move out of the five largest

units on Walker Street when they were slated to be demolished to make room for other development.

The Caring Place also provides three permanent affordable housing units in Cary.

Cary High Youth Start Relay For Warmth

A group of cross country runners, who also happen to be the executive council of the Cary High School student body, raised \$3,200 for The Caring Place in January by organizing Relay for Warmth.

"It was a combination of a lot of things that just fell into place," said Will Thomason, student body president and a member of Greenwood Forest Baptist Church, which supports The Caring Place.

The idea was hatched after a Fall food drive in which Cary High placed fourth in Wake County among all of the participating schools. During that time, Thomason and his friends learned that a large percentage of students who received a free or reduced lunch went to Cary High.

"We got to talking about how a lot of fundraisers are for people in Africa and that kind of thing, but we sometimes need to look in the local community," Thomason said.
