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


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A Message From Leslie

Success Stories



Shanice - Program Graduate

Shanice, a single mom with two children, was stably employed in Raleigh when a medical condition required her to have a routine surgery. Complications required an extended hospital stay and resulted in missed wages. Moving in with family in Greensboro, she worked long hours to catch up all while commuting two hours each way to work, daycare, and school. The hardships of her extreme work schedule and the daily commute negatively impacted her children, Emery and Emmitt. Entering TCP's program, Shanice benefitted from the respite of having her family back together while learning vital financial skills. Thankfully, her children blossomed in TCP's Children and Teen programs.

Mary - Program Graduate

Before entering the TCP program, I was living in a rooming house (homeless) and unable to get an apartment due to my credit. My credit score was 348 and even though I worked full-time, I was going in circles and I didn't see any way out of the rut I was in.

We were the first family to be accepted during the pandemic and TCP offered a new way of doing things and IT WORKS! Creating a weekly budget, watching my spending habits, accounting for money spent, and not having to pay rent, utilities or other cost of living expenses made it possible for me to pay off several debts and my credit score soared.

When I graduated from TCP, I had saved over \$8,000. Today my score is at 690, and I am ready to become a First Time Homeowner! I thank the TCP staff, volunteers and everyone at TCP for helping me to reach goals I thought were unobtainable. What TCP offers is not a hand out but a hand up. Work the program and the program will work!

In the Next 3-5 Years:

- Increase housing to support 20+ families at one time
- Nearly double the transitional housing families served to 60 annually enhanced by graduate program workforce development and homeownership prep programming by 50% or more

A Vision Forward

The Carying Place celebrated 30 years of supporting families and continues to elevate by providing these four offerings and elevating more working homeless families to a place of long-term self-sufficiency. Our three-five year vision is to acquire a facility that allows us to house more families in one central location and provide enhanced services. To accomplish this we need to:

- 1 Extend Our Transitional Housing (TH) to accommodate our growing liust list of transitional housing families from ~36 famililes to 60 annually. We plan to add an additional 210 10+ housing units where we can house families to accommodate this growth.
- 2 Create Graduate a Graduation Program Housing for program participants at a program fee that takes their of 30% of their average monhtly monthly income into account. This affordable approach to housing will allows a select group of families them to stay heavily invested in the program for an additional year to work focus on workforce development and Homeownership.
- 3 Grow Our Workforce Development offering to include all the new TH families.
- 4 Focus Eligible Families on The Homeownership Journey preparing those families for strategic homeownership planning.
- **Refocus on Growing Our Endowment** to provide the security and long-term stability. We teach our families to plan well for their futures, so we "practice what we preach." We started our Endowment in 2019 and currently have over \$800K. Over the next 3-10 years, we will focus on that endowment growth for the future.


